The large building envelope allows for additional structures or new construction. The property is contiguous to hundreds of thousands of acres of the Coronado National Forest known for its multiple use opportunities. Mountain biking, horse back riding, hiking, wildlife photography, camping are available year round. At 4900 feet the climate is temperate and ranges from 50 to 90 degree daytime temperatures. The majority of rainfall comes between July and September with the occasional winter storm and every once in a while snowfall of 3-4 inches that last a few days.

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In addition to the paddocks around the headquarters these are the large pastures included in Lazy J2 South Ranch Estate:

From the front porch you can see "The Farm", approximately 79 acres that stretch out to the north. There is a cienega at the far north end which offers seasonal water close to the ground and natural irrigation for winter grasses. Fall brings a splash of vibrant orange as the golden eye blooms.



The Farm

The first pasture east of the house is called "Home Pasture" and is around 340 ac and includes a tributary that runs seasonally that feeds into the Santa Cruz River. There are magnificent oaks and towering cottonwood trees dotted throughout the pasture. The softly rolling grassland undulates into gentle ridges and broad protected swales. An easy two mile hike or running path runs through the pasture from riparian area to stunning sweeping vistas.

Home Windmill is approximately 160' deep with static water at 12'.

Furthest east is "PONs Pasture" and 136 acres. Settled by the Pon's family in the late 1800s under the Home Stead Act one can detect where the house overlooked the broad open pasture and once stood atop a mesa above the A Bar Draw creek bed. Pon's windmill supplies water to a large open ring tank as well as a livestock/wildlife drinker in both Pon's pasture and the east end of Home Pasture.
